RESCUE MISSION HITS BEST SELLER LISTS

he Children's edition of Agenda 21 was launched by its young editors in London, New York, Bonn and Barbados. Over 100,000 copies of the book are now in print, in 14 languages. It has reached best-seller lists in the UK and USA. Many things are happening as a result......

Day of Access

In January, Peace Child hosted a conference of young people, teachers and municipal councillors to brainstorm the Day of Access. The resulting Statement of Principles and Action Plan outlined a campaign for a Day of Access that was presented to Shridath Ramphal and Ingvar Carlsson of the UN Commission on Global Governance and a campaign was mapped out. At the UN launch of Rescue Mission, Undersecretary Nitin Desai, speaking on behalf of the Secretary General, announced UN Support for the idea of a Day of Access: "We encourage every country to hold an annual Day of Access for Children...." He also announced his support for awarding Rescue Mission Representative Cards to those groups who can provide evidence of long-term activity in pursuit of Agenda 21 goals. These cards are an idea developed by young people to help give them the authority and credibility they need to gain access to decision-makers in government and industry.

Electronic Focal Points Meeting

The Rescue Mission editors had begged the UN to allow them to reconvene to plan the Rescue Mission Action Plan. No funds were available, so they held the meeting anyway-via phone and fax. It was great! - this way we got to meet over the phone all members of the groups, not just one or two representatives. An agenda was set, views were expressed and a Strategy Document was developed as a result. It was a great medium to meet, and the practice will be repeated in the fall.

Commission for Sustainable Development

This is perhaps the most significant news of all for our network. Nitin Desai, who calls Rescue Mission " my favorite edition of Agenda 21 - " invited Peace Child to put together a Youth presentation to the CSD. We held a 90-minute session with Desai plus ministers from Holland and Malaysia in front of an audience of about 50. The six kids were clear, bright, fresh, funny, intelligent as they related the results of the Focal Points meeting - the indifference of governments and school staff; the need for Agenda 21 to be on school curricula; the difficulty of motivating their peers: eco-enthusiasm is "un-cool" to most kids over 13; the need for global networking to make the kids feel they are not alone.

War

One spoke of the war in ex-Yugoslavia - how impossible it is to even dream about sustainable development until peace can be secured. It was all a refreshing change from the usual diplo-babble doled out from soft pulpits elsewhere in the UN. As a result, CSD is planning a major project to find out how different governments

are involving young people in the implementing Agenda 21. Nothing official yet, but we are hoping that Rescue Missioners will be invited to do this research and prepare the report. Then a major conference will be held in early 1996 when those governments who are listening to the Voices of Children will encourage other governments to do likewise.

Action Newsletter released

Edited by kids, for kids, this newsletter is choc-full of action ideas that kids - and adults - can undertake to implement Agenda 21.

Kids translate the book themselves

Two Finnish schools are undertaking the Finnish translation of Rescue Mission; the Thai International School has edited the Thai translation. Great language practice and great for the book as it preserves the youthful feel in the different languages.

Rescue Mission to the UN

Based on the success of the book, the UN 50 secretariat has invited us to create a Young People's History of the United Nations - past, present and future. UN Secretary General, Boutros Boutros-Ghali, making the invitation, said: "I hope young people everywhere will help with this project and find out what the UN has meant to your community over the past half century." From his address to the UNICEF Council May 94 "Think of a street kid who is in a bad situation. He lives with a vision of what he wants to be and how he will get to be that. He is frustrated; he wants to do something, but he cannot. He walks up and down the street with ideas and energy flowing in him. Chances are a UNICEF car will pull up, give him an immunization jab and leave him. But he needs more than that. Eventually, he will get tired of walking and sit down. Frustration turns to despair, and in despair he will put out his hand for the extra change which is all the system has to offer him. BUT - if he had a place to go, somewhere to be heard and helped, somewhere that could be helping him or her in their personal development, that would allow UNICEF to know what children really need - that is our vision of what UNICEF should be doing. IT'S OUR TURN!

"It's Our Turn" - April 8-18; Murzsteg, Austria. Under the challenging leadership of Voice of the Children and United Games, with funding from the Norwegian government, 30 kids from ex-Yugoslavia gathered to "get to know each other, learn each other's perspectives on what's been happening, and establish lines of communication."

Sessions

In the week, they produced a film, a newsletter, a radio programme and some animated film. They also attended morning sessions conducted by some brilliant UNICEF-selected psycho-sociologists. At the end of the session, the European Peace negotiator, Thorvald Stoltenburg, spent several hours with them, listening to their points.

Direct communication

Jelena (Serb) "I'm generally a cheerful person but today, in the morning workshop, when Damir spoke about his life, I was crying. I think the war has taught me to enjoy life more. I believe that existence has a deeper meaning. I don't know how they make people slaughter and rape. A psychologist told me that 80% of people are actually psychopaths: in a normal environment, you don't notice it, but in a war, they do whatever they are told. I believe that..."

Petrit (Albanian, Kosovo) "I feel I was born in the wrong place at the wrong time. I'd like to go abroad, to England. What can I do to help my people? Do my little workshops? How great - I can't do nothing, I'm just a young boy. I'm alone - I'm afraid - I can't seen another way this is going to end up than war..."

Daniela (Croatia - after the bombing of Gorazde) "I'm not sorry - I hope they (Serbs) know now what it means to be afraid. Funny - I have tried to see Schindler's List but something always comes between. It's not really a movie for us. This is our Schindler's List. We live it every day."

THE RIGHTS OF THE CHILD

"It's Only Right!" - UNICEF have produced a super new teaching guide on the Convention of the Rights of the Child. It explains the Convention in simple terms, provides excellent classroom exercises and gives examples of how kids can take action in different parts of the world. The new instructional guide is helps prepare for teachers and delegates, and makes clear what an excellent educational instrument the MUN is: run by schools for schools, it allows traditional educational institutions to address global issues in their curricula in a practical, youth involving, and deeply youth empowering way.

Disputes ended

Natalia von Mensdorf-Pouilly, the young Secretary General of THIMUN 26, reports: "In one week, we managed to find solutions to global environmental and social problems, ended the dispute between Azerbaijan and Armenia, found a way to end the bloody war in Bosnia, saw the US embargo on Cuba lifted and witnessed the signing of an agreement between Turkey, Greece and Cyprus.

Justice

We also included a Special Conference on the International Court of Justice. To me, this conference has shown that our generation has the strength and the vision to cope with, and to solve, the many grave problems that our planet faces today."

Pathways to Peace

Meanwhile, Pathways to Peace is planning a Children's World Peace Festival, June 22-26 in Sausalito, across the Golden Gate Bridge from San Francisco. The Festival will build a "community eco-system which will mirror the process of living sustainably on the earth..." while also building a 6,000lb 5-story Globe using bicycle power. Interactive educational activities, exhibitions, music, face-painting etc. will allow children to "experience their interconnection with each other, with the natural environment and with the human spirit." HEAL THE WORLD

Plans for the big Children's Forum are on hold while Michael Jackson heals his own world, but the Foundation has been collecting toys from children in USA, Canada, UK and Europe on Operation Christmas Child which brought 125,000 gifts in shoe-boxes to the refugee children of ex-Yugoslavia in December.

European Youth Parliament

Europe 2020

The Oxford University undergraduate conference in March was a great success and is expected to become an annual event. The theme was "Europe 2020" with 120 students from 17 Universities; the conference papers were presented to the EU Forward Studies Unit.

Guest Editorial

I am just back from a wonderful experience with young people from the former Yugoslavia, a meeting which came about because adults and children were able to listen to each other. The meeting, which took place in Mürzsteg in Austria, was a success because

- the three organizations were open to the ideas which came from the young people themselves;
- the young people participated in the practical planning of the event
- the adults were willing to listen to the young ones and let them make all the major decisions;

Listen

The more I work with children and young people, the more I realise how important it is to really listen to them. They are not always right. They make mistakes and they misunderstand just like everybody else. But they have many ideas, many concerns, and they have a need and a right to be heard and taken seriously.

Adults

Most adults are not used to the role of just listening. Our intentions may be the most noble but, deep inside, most of us still believe that we are the ones who know best. We want to help the children say and do what we feel would be best for them. By organizing

different kinds of events, where children, young people and adults cooperate on equal terms, I hope we shall be able to learn a lot from each other.

Open.

We all have to be more open and more critical. If children feel that they are being manipulated, however gently, they should say so. If adults feel uneasy about something, they should learn to raise the question and discuss it openly. The best way to learn is by being open and by listening to one another.

It is not easy. All NGOs have their own agenda. We all need positive publicity and we are afraid that other groups may run off with our ideas. Let us not forget that we all work for the same aim: children's right to participate and to be heard. We shall not succeed until we have learned to cooperate and to share with each other.

Cooperation

I sincerely hope that we who work with children and young people will be able to show the way to genuine cooperation. The day when NGOs are able to come down from their different mountain tops to work together will be a happy one. The day when children and adults are able to listen to each other and participate as equal partners will be even better.
