The only additional THANK YOU must be to Aldwickbury School, its Headmaster, Vernon Hales, its excellent head of Music, Jonathan Bungard, and its wonderful Chamber Choir for providing the musical leadership + the searching questions for the first intergenerational dialogue. Also THANK YOU to James Ellis who secured the 3 x young students whose questions led the second intergenerational dialogue. Finally, a big THANK YOU to Richard Jolly for coming all the way up from Brighton to bring his experience and sparkle to the debates. Both resulted in what I felt were pretty strong agreements on the following priorities for the Next 75 Years of the UN (to be forwarded to Harpenden Town Council):

- 1. A World totally free of Single-use plastic as soon as possible and certainly! a Plastic-Free Harpenden by 2030 [For guidance, see Surfers against Sewage Guide]
- 2. Better role models for children from political, business and church leaders; (<u>Suggestion</u>: create your own Role Models from history and from other disciplines. Just because political leaders right now are rather under-whelming, doesn't mean good role models don't exist: check out Sir Richard's three names:
 - Jacinda Ardern, Prime Minister of New Zealand;
 - Carlos Alvarado Quesada, President of Costa Rica and –
 - Greta Thunberg, 17-year old Swedish environmental activist
- 3. Reduce military spending: let's reduce it by a third by 2030;
- 4. Increase peace-building / human security budgets: it employs more people

- 5. Let's have more countries with no armies: there are 22 at the moment. Can we double that number by 2030? (Learn how Costa Rica did it)
- 6. Votes at 16 in the UK by 2030 & every UN member state by 2050. It already is 16 in big countries like Brazil and Argentina, also some European countries like Austria and Malta. Make it the norm;
- 7. More women like Jacinda Aherne (New Zealand) in leadership roles; check her out;
- 8. An end the <u>scandal</u> of subsidies on Fossil Fuel mining and prospecting: the world spends \$400 <u>Billion</u> propping up the oil companies; the EU gives them €55 billion with the UK the biggest subsidiser! STOP IT!!
- 9. Give subsidies and levy Green taxes to encourage the growth of green economies everywhere. Like in Costa Rica, Germany and New Zealand;
- 10. Support for countries like Russia and Nigeria to cease oil production and transition investment and jobs to Green / renewable economies. (They really need it!)
- 11. Legislate to encourage electric car travel and make SUVs NOT cost-effective; check out the comparative pollution from them.
- 12. Encourage and celebrate local initiatives like those pioneered by <u>Lewes, Sussex</u>, and <u>Totnes</u> in Devon. (read: <u>From What is to What If</u>? By Rob Hopkins, founder of <u>Transition Towns</u>). Get some of those initiatives happening in Harpenden

Major Learning for Peace Child Intl.: This was the first time we'd heard any one talk about the concept of 3 x United Nations. Sir Richard's analysis was highly instructive:

- 1. The official UN of Member States: owned and operated by sovereign governments
- 2. The UN Secretariat Staff:— UN Staff / Civil Servants have much more freedom and power to create and shape the global agenda than civil servants who serve national elected governments because they are required to implement the elected government's manifesto programme;
- 3. The "We the Peoples..." UN: NGOs, Civil Society all of us have the power to lobby and pressurize the UN and its member states just as Greta Thunberg has done!
- 4. <u>The Digital UN</u>: We feel that, for the 21st Century, it is time to add a 4th UN the one that exists in the virtual world, online: we need to expand and strengthen the UN that is able to reach tens of millions of people instantly over the internet.
